In June 2011, Oman's Ministry of Higher Education began to distribute 1,500 merit-based undergraduate scholarships from a fund set up by the Sultan of Oman. Of the 1,500 scholarships awarded for study throughout the world, 500 were allocated for study in the United States; and of the 500 students who came to the U.S., 55 selected The University of Tulsa.


Omani students study many fields — accounting and chemical, electrical, mechanical and petroleum engineering — with the majority (about 40) in PE.

"Many Omani engineers recommend it," said Ahlam Al Battashi, who is a senior in the McDougall School of Petroleum Engineering.

"Even our minister of oil and gas has a degree from here."

She is referring to His Excellency Mohammed bin Hamad Al Rumhy, who received a Master of Science degree in Petroleum Engineering from The University of Tulsa in 1983.

Mohammed Al-Riyami learned about TU through his family. "My uncle recommended TU to my dad, and I'm really glad he did," Mohammed said. "For me, coming to Tulsa was absolutely the right decision."

THINK LOCATION


Since your very first English lesson, you've known you wanted to study in the United States of America. The University of Tulsa (TU) — located in the middle of the U.S. — could be your best option.

At TU, various research projects offer students opportunities to learn outside the classroom. Also, F-1 students can use their first year of Optional Practical Training to get real-world experience.

The world-renowned McDougall School of Petroleum Engineering in the College of Engineering and Natural Sciences is just one of several programs that attract students from across the U.S. and around the globe to The University of Tulsa.

Increasingly, TU is known for offering undergraduates the chance to do the kind of research that is reserved for graduate students at larger universities.

THE TIME YOU SPEND AT A UNIVERSITY can be much more than expanding and perfecting your knowledge of a particular field. At The University of Tulsa, students have opportunities outside the classroom to make friends, hone their leadership abilities, and simply have fun.

Recent TU graduate **Shazni Adam** (BS '11, Petroleum Engineering) used his time at the university to not only earn a degree, but also to become an active participant in the life of the campus.

"While I was in TU, I was involved in quite a few organizations, namely the Malaysian Students Association of TU (MASATU), The Association of International Students (AIS), the Tau Beta Pi Engineering Honor Society and Phi Kappa Phi," he noted. He served as president of MASATU and vice president of the AIS. Additionally, he worked as the gym supervisor in the Collins Fitness Center for nearly four years — from mid-2007 until the day he graduated.

The ultimate payoff? He acquired leadership skills that now serve him well in his job as a drilling engineer for PETRONAS, one of the major oil and gas companies in the world with operations around the globe.

"I'm proud to be working in PETRONAS," he said. "It is the main contributor to Malaysia's economy. Currently, I'm part of a team that is developing a gas field discovery offshore Sabah (one of the states in Malaysia)."

AS A KID GROWING UP IN GUADALAJARA, Mexico, **Jose Moreiras** said that he'd never considered becoming a petroleum engineer simply because he'd never heard of one.

"My high school counselor recommended that I look into it, and I did," he recalled.

After exploring the field, Jose chose to attend The University of Tulsa, which is home to the internationally renowned McDougall School of Petroleum Engineering. Pursuing a PE degree, however, was not the only thing that attracted Jose to TU.

"The size of the university was important for me," he said. "I came from a small high school, so I already knew the advantage of being able to really know your teachers."

School size and an excellent reputation for producing outstanding petroleum engineers around the world were important deciding

"As a drilling engineer, I frequently travel offshore to assist, monitor and supervise drilling operations to ensure everything goes according to plan in a safe and timely manner," Shazni noted. "The drilling courses as well as other PE courses I took in TU have helped me in my current job a lot," he said. "I had a good learning experience in TU. There is good interaction between professors and students due to the small student-to-teacher ratio. I was lucky to have had great professors who always made some time to attend to my questions and needs."
